

SACRAMENTO COUNTY 2021 Affordable Housing Needs Report




KEY FINDINGS

- 81% of extremely low-income
 households are paying more than
 half of their income on housing costs
 compared to just 2% of moderate income households.
- 58,383 low-income renter
 households in Sacramento County
 do not have access to an affordable
 home.
- Low-Income Housing Tax Credit production and preservation in Sacramento County increased by 19% between 2019 and 2020.

- Renters in Sacramento County need to earn \$26.77 per hour - 1.9 times the state minimum wage - to afford the average monthly asking rent of \$1,392.
- State funding increased 155% and federal funding increased 63% for housing production and preservation in Sacramento County from FY 2018-19 to FY 2019-20.


AFFORDABLE HOMES SHORTFALL

58,383 low-income renter households in Sacramento County do not have access to an affordable home.



COST BURDENED RENTER HOUSEHOLDS

81% of ELI households in Sacramento County are paying more than half of their income on housing costs compared to just 2% of moderate-income households.




WHO CAN AFFORD TO RENT

Renters need to earn 1.9 times minimum wage to afford the average asking rent in Sacramento County.




FUNDING FOR HOUSING

State funding **increased 155**% and federal funding **increased 63**% for housing production and preservation in Sacramento County from FY 2018-19 to FY 2019-20.



LIHTC PRODUCTION AND PRESERVATION

Low-Income Housing Tax Credit production and preservation in Sacramento County **increased by 19**% between 2019 and 2020.



STATEWIDE POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

In addition to critical COVID-19 efforts, the Partnership calls on State leaders to take the following actions to provide relief to low-income families struggling with unaffordable and unstable housing:

- Initiate a \$10 billion statewide housing bond to fund five more years of affordable housing for low-income families and people experiencing homelessness.
- Permanently fund local governments to implement flexible homelessness solutions by recapturing
 \$2.4 billion per year lost through corporate tax loopholes and reductions.
- Make permanent the \$500 million expansion of the state Low-Income Housing Tax Credit to increase affordable housing production through public/private partnerships.
- Empower voters to support building affordable homes locally by lowering the supermajority approval threshold required for housing ballot measures to 55%.
- Fund the conversion of commercial properties and market-rate rental properties occupied by lowincome households into affordable homes.
- Allow new apartment and condominium developments to be built in commercial and mixed-use zones when at least 20% of the homes are affordable to low-income households.
- Speed the construction of affordable homes and reduce uncertainty and costs by streamlining the award of state funding for affordable housing developments from four different state agencies into one decision-making process.

LOCAL POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SACRAMENTO COUNTY



- 1. All local policies should be created and analyzed using a racial equity lens to affirmatively further fair housing. In addition, to address continuing impacts of the pandemic, policies should be adopted to get people off the street, keep people in their homes and continue building new affordable rental homes.
- 2. Support and advocate for State adoption of Roadmap Home 2030 (https://roadmaphome2030.org) strategies.
- 3. Adopt or increase local revenue sources for affordable home development including exploring use of or increasing in lieu fees, commercial linkage fees, real estate transfer tax, document record fee, luxury tax, or local affordable housing bonds, etc.). Adequate local funds for leverage are critical to effectively competing for State housing funding.
- 4. Create or strengthen tenant protection programs to control excessive rent increases and prevent evictions. Regularly collect and analyze data on rental conditions. Consider developing a right to counsel in eviction/ unlawful detainer proceedings.
- 5. Continue or expand participation on Project Homekey program.
- 6. Require 10 percent of all new affordable rental communities be set aside for people experiencing homelessness.
- 7. Adopt policies to prevent displacement including strategies to protect senior and low-income homeowners such as targeting home repair programs and no-net loss policies for existing affordable housing and condo conversion ordinances.
- 8. Provide targeted first-time homebuyer programs in neighborhoods that have suffered from historic disinvestment including use of State homeownership funds through CalHFA and HCD.
